1. Summary Overview

The Chairperson of Peacemaking Advisory Group Cabo Delgado (PAG), Bishop Trevor Mwamba paid a preparatory visit to Dar es Salaam and Zanzibar in the period 15 - 22 March 2023. The objective of the visit was to brief both former President Jakaya Kikwete of the United Republic of Tanzania and former President Amani Abeid Karume of Zanzibar on the proposed programme of activities of the PAG, on its history so far and on the composition of the PAG.

While in Dar es Salaam, the Bishop Mwamba also provided a briefing of the proposed PAG initiative to former Tanzanian Foreign Minister Liberata Mulamula, to the former Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Joseph Sokoine, to the Director of Research for Poverty Alleviation (REPOA), Dr. Donald Mmari and to the Deputy Head of the Delegation of the European Union to the United Republic of Tanzania, Emilio Rossetti.

Bishop Mwamba consulted with the office of former President Kikwete and as the former President was on mission to the United Nations in New York, the briefing took place on-line. With former President Karume, Bishop Mwamba met on Zanzibar.

Bishop Mwamba explained to both former President Kikwete and former President Karume the objectives of PAG to contribute to peace in Cabo Delgado by assisting in the facilitation of dialogue for peace while the Bishop also provided the former Presidents with an overview of the history and of the composition of the PAG.

The former Presidents expressed their full appreciation and support for the initiative. The initiative was, in the view of the former Presidents, important; while the military approach had brought a certain measure of stability to Cabo Delgado, the time had now arrived to address the root causes of the conflict in the province and this could only be done through dialogue by all concerned.

As chair of the SADC Panel of Elders, former President Kikwete explained, he was not in a position to become part of the PAG, but would cooperate fully with the PAG where possible, thus contributing to synergy between the SADC Panel of Elders and the PAG and to the return of peaceful conditions in Cabo Delgado.

Former President Karume had already accepted to advise the PAG as required.

Bishop Mwamba agreed with former Tanzanian Foreign Minister Liberata Mulamula, the former Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Joseph Sokoine, the Director of Reseach for Poverty Alleviation (REPOA), Dr. Donald Mmari and the Deputy Head of the Delegation of the European Union to the United Republic of Tanzania, Emilio Rossetti, to keep them fully informed on progress, as they were all convinced that the situation in north Mozambique merited an initiative such as the PAG.

The visit of Bishop Trevor Mwamba laid a solid foundation for the two subsequent visits of the PAG to Dar es Salaam and Dodoma, which are documented in PAG reports nr IV and V.
